



Three McTimoney equine practitioners will present research at this year's British Society of Animal Science Conference, in Chester next month.

All McTimoney Animal Practitioners have completed an undergraduate degree in a science and a three year post-graduate training course at the McTimoney College of Chiropractic in Abingdon, Oxfordshire. The college is currently the only validated course in Europe in teaching techniques for adjusting animals.

It is the second year that the McTimoney Animal Association has been invited to the prestigious conference, at the University of Chester, on April 14 and 15.

Alex Crosby Jones will present on her study "The effect of manual chiropractic (McTimoney) treatment on pressure measurements beneath the saddle". Nicole Rossa's study on "The effects of manual chiropractic (McTimoney) and instrument assisted chiropractic on spinal mechanical nociceptive thresholds (MNTs) in flat racehorses without clinical signs" will be presented, as will Jin Langstone's research on, "A preliminary study of the effect of manual chiropractic treatment on the splenius muscle in horses when measured by surface electromyography".

McTimoney Animal Association chairwoman Sally Trott said: "We are thrilled that our former students have earned themselves the opportunity to present their valuable research at such a renowned event".
